All are invited to attend this service at which our sangha will pay homage to O-jizōsama through meditation, music, and sutra chanting. The bodhisattva Jizō, also known as O-jizōsama in Japanese and Kṣitigarbha in Sanskrit, is enshrined in a small structure in front of the temple. Jizō is regarded as the protector of travelers, women, and children and is the patron bodhisattva of deceased babies and children. He also liberates beings from realms of suffering and displays compassion for animals. A portion of the service will be dedicated to the memory of beloved deceased children and pets. ## If the World Could Come to Our Bon Dance

If the world could come to our Bon Dance, people could see that peace, harmony, and loving-kindness are possible when egos are set aside, cooperation is valued, and the greatest wish in everyone’s heart is to bring happiness to all. From set up to clean up, our volunteers got right to work and pitched in wherever help was needed, selflessly giving their time and energy for the sake of the community.

How happy were the dancers, led by sensei Winnie and her senior students — Jean, Roxie, Reiko, Amy, and Megan! People of all ages, genders, and ethnicities freely joined the circle of dancers, waving their arms and moving to the rhythms of the recorded music and taiko. Up in the music tower, 93-year-old Walter greeted the crowd and announced the dances, together with his young assistant Michael Ii. “As long as I can climb up the steps to the *yagura*, I’ll be here to help” is what Walter told me. Throughout the afternoon, Gilbert and Warren kept the music flowing out of the speakers in the right order.

Great energy, joy, and skill were demonstrated by the adult and youth taiko drummers from both Kona Daifukuji Taiko and Kona Hongwanji Taiko. Randal and Susie’s full-of-love Zumba was another crowd pleaser. Many others worked tirelessly in the gift shop, towel booth, food and shaved ice tent, and kitchen. At the last minute, when we learned that no police officer had responded to our request, taiko dad Officer Furuto, wearing shorts and rubber slippers, jumped in to help direct traffic, freeing the parking crew to direct cars on temple grounds. It was dark when the last volunteers walked up the hill to their cars, their way lit by the overhead lights, thoughtfully strung by Larry a couple days earlier. My heartfelt thanks go out to everyone, including the event’s dedicated co-chairs, Barb Shōshin and Kai.

Setup, as always, was a masterclass in teamwork. Stephen Tanaka, Warren Ikeda, Shaun Roth, and our taiko groups had everything dialed in. A friend who came to help was stunned that we finished setting up in just an hour and a half. "It was like clockwork," he said. I couldn't agree more. That's the power of Daifukuji.

Our MCs—Walter Kimura and Mike Ii—brought their usual energy and warmth, helping to keep the crowd engaged and connected. Larry's thoughtful lighting made the entire event feel festive and safe.

Huge thanks to all who cooked and served food to keep us fueled (yakisoba was a standout—so *ono!*) and to the taiko families who donated both materials and labor. The Good Luck *Somen* at the end of Bon Dance was so refreshing that everyone forgot to go home. It turned into a Bon Dance after-party!

The Japanese-style shave ice was another big hit—we sold over 270 servings! Mahalo to Yukio Muramatsu and his family for keeping the dancers cool and refreshed. And thank you to the Adult Taiko group for assisting at the shave ice station. Bon Dance and shave ice really are the perfect match, don't you think?

And finally, a quiet thank you to Bobby Command, Mike Nakade, and Tony Takai who manned the entrance. We're also grateful to Officer Joel Furuto, who stepped up when we were unable to obtain an off-duty officer. And thank you to everyone who parked outside the temple. Safety is always our top priority.

To every single person who gave their time, energy, and aloha to this year's Bon Dance—please accept my heartfelt gratitude. You helped make 2025's celebration one to remember.

## **2025 Precepts Study with Rev. Jikō to Begin August 2**

**A series of weekly online Zoom classes from August 2 - November 15, 2025\***

*Saturdays from 8:00 a.m. 9:00 a.m. HST via ZOOM*

Registration is open for a series of Zoom Dharma classes on the 16 Bodhisattva precepts, which Reverend Jikō offers once a year.

These precepts form the moral and ethical foundation of the Soto Zen tradition. They are not commandments. Rather, they can be regarded as trainings in mindfulness and mindful living. This course is meant to be a period of study and reflection on one's own life. Sharing is done in an atmosphere that is gentle and compassionate. Many have found their lives illuminated and enriched by this inner journey taken in the context of a supportive and non-judgmental sangha. All are welcome to join these sessions, including those who have previously studied the precepts and received their Buddhist names.

No textbook will be used. Rev. Jikō will provide the reading materials.

This study of the precepts will culminate in a Soto Zen Buddhist Confirmation Ceremony which will be held on November 22, 2025 at Daifukuji Soto Mission. Participation in this ceremony is optional.



Rev. Jikō offers the Dharma freely. There is no class fee. If one wishes to do so, one may make a donation to Daifukuji Soto Mission.

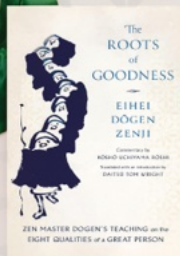
## Meditation

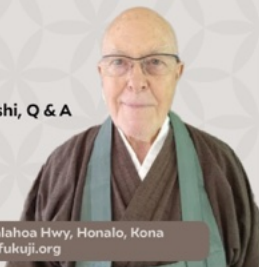

These are the new arrivals:

*Hiking Zen* by Phap Xa and Phap Luu is a very recent book, subtitled *Train Your Mind in Nature*.

*Misfit Spirit* by Jay Sakashita is the book that was referred to during the Obon Service on June 29.

There are three new audio books on CD:

*Looking Deeply and Teachings on Love* are both by Thich Nhat Hanh, and *A Path with Heart* is by Jack Kornfield.

These last two are unique and wonderful how-to art books in Japanese:

*Lessons on Hanging: Scroll Repair for Anyone* by G. Koike has copious photographs showing exactly how to mount artwork on a traditional Japanese scroll. Every different step in the process is shown perfectly. This is an amazing book, and we've never had anything like it before.

*How to Draw Festival Events* by G. Yamada is from 1978, and it shows how to capture the joy of a Bon Dance, as well as other festivals, in visual artwork. The ink sketches of taiko drummers really show their vibrant energy.
